Phrasal Verbs are verbs that consist of a verb plus one or two particles which, when added, change the verb's meaning. These particles can be adverbs or prepositions. Some Phrasal Verbs contain both. Together these words form a short phrase, so we call them Phrasal Verbs.

Adverbial Phrasal Verbs can be transitive (with object) or intransitive (no object). Prepositions always have an object, so all **Prepositional Phrasal Verbs** and **Phrasal-Prepositional Verbs** (Phrasal Verbs containing adverb and preposition) are transitive.

Some Phrasal Verbs with an object are "separable". With these you can put the object <i>before</i> or <i>after</i> the particle. However, if the object is a pronoun, it always comes <i>before</i> the particle.

Some Phrasal Verbs with an object are "inseparable", so the object always comes <i>after</i> the particle (even if it's a pronoun).
